

- February 14 10:30 AM: transport tables back to GPUUC. 1 volunteer and a truck needed.



The Little-Known 4th Branch of Government and the Ethics of Electric Bills presented by Melanie Beikman, head of Interfaith Power and Light and


sponsored by the GPUUC Adult Faith Development Committee, the GPUUC Social Justice Council, the Interfaith Power and Light, Northern AZ Climate Change Alliance, and Interfaith Climate Action Tea, Join us for a conversation about electricity: who regulates it, who decides your electricity bill, and Arizona's role in the climate crisis.

There is a little known "4th branch" of Arizona government" that regulates utilities and other businesses. In that role, the 5-member Arizona Corporation Commission impacts your utility bills as well as how we produce the electricity we all use.

As UU's we look at the cost of energy through the lens of Justice, Equity and Compassion in Human Relations, and we consider the sources of our energy use in light of the Respect for the Interdependent Web of Existence and our stewardship of creation.

January 4, 2026: Kwanzaa

Kwanzaa was created in 1966 by Dr. Maulana Karenga, a professor and activist, in the aftermath of the Watts Riots in Los Angeles. Kwanzaa is modeled on the traditional African harvest festivals, such as those of the Shanti and Zulu people, to emphasize community, collective work, and the fruit of labor. The name "Kwanzaa" comes from the Swahili phrase "matunda ya kwanza" meaning "first fruit."

1. The celebration centers around seven core principles, "Nquzo Saba":
2. Umga-Unity
3. Kujichagulia-Self-determination
4. Ujima-Collective work and responsibility
5. Ujamaa-Cooperative Economics
6. Nia-Purpose
7. Kuumba-Creativity
8. Iman-Faith

January 11, 2026:

Time of All Ages/Three Kings Day

Today began with the students in the sanctuary,

listening to Rev. Michelle read her own illustrated story, "Time for All Ages." The message of the story involved several situations where we may find ourselves helping each other make decisions about our lives.

Three Kings Day is also known as the Feast of the Epiphany, in some traditions, and is celebrated on January 6. It is meant to signify the arrival of the Wiseman, or Magi, in Bethlehem.

In Mexico and many other Latin American countries, Santa Claus is not as popular as the Three Kings, who are believed to be the bearers of gifts, therefore leaving presents for children in or near a pair of their shoes.

The "Rosca de Reyes" or King Ring Cake, is a food tradition in places such as Spain, France, and Latin America. The Rosca de Reyes is a sweet, wreath-shaped bread containing candied fruit, and often with figurines of the baby Jesus hidden inside. Whoever finds the token Jesus in their slice of bread, is obligated to host an upcoming party for the others present at the celebration.



The names of the multinational Three Kings are as follows: Melchior from Persia, Gaspar from India and Baltazar from Arabia.

The students each enjoyed cutting their own slice of the Kings Cake, all hoping to **not** find a baby figurine!

January 18, 2026:

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day

The focus today was not solely on Martin Luther King, but on the four children that he had with his wife, Coretta Scott King. All four children were quite young when he was assassinated on April 4, 1968. All of Dr. King's children have worked to honor his legacy by promoting civil rights and social justice.



Yolanda Denise King, the eldest child born in 1955, was 12 years old when her father was killed. She grew up to become a minister, civil rights activist, and advocate for women's rights. Sadly, she passed away from a heart condition in 2007.

Martin Luther King III, born in 1957, was 10 years old when his father died. He is a professor and a human rights activist. He had traveled with his father on several social justice missions prior to King's death.

Dexter Scott King, born in 1961, served as chairman of the King Center for social justice in Atlanta. He was 7 years old when his father was assassinated. Unfortunately, Dexter passed away in 2024 due to prostate cancer.

Bernice Albertine King, born in 1963, the youngest of the King children, was just 5 years old when her father was killed. She is a lawyer, minister, and civil rights leader.

Yolanda Renee King, born in 2008, is the only grandchild of Dr. King and is daughter to Martin Luther King III. She is currently a 17-year-old youth activist, author, and speaker. She continues her grandparent's legacy by advocating for gun violence prevention, voting rights and climate justice. She authored the book "We Dream a World" in 2024.

The students of Faith Development created a poster of the “*Hands of Love*” and shared their dreams for the future.

Engage, Educate, Empower: Uniting to End HIV/AIDS in Black Communities, February 7

National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day (NBHAAD) is dedicated to raising awareness about the disproportionate impact of HIV on Black and African American communities. First observed in 1999, NBHAAD highlights the importance of community involvement and improved access to HIV education, prevention, testing, and treatment services. This year’s theme is “Engage, Educate, Empower: Uniting to End HIV/AIDS in Black Communities.”

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), national HIV prevention efforts led to a 10 percent decrease in the number of Black or African American people diagnosed with HIV between 2017 and 2021. Despite this decrease, HIV continues to have a disproportionate impact in Black communities.

In 2021, 40 percent of new HIV diagnoses occurred in Black and African American people, although this population accounted for only 13 percent of the total population. This disparity is even wider in the South, where Black and African Ameri-

can people accounted for 49 percent of new diagnoses in 2021 but comprised only 19 percent of the population.

In addition, the majority of new HIV diagnoses occur in Black or African American gay, bisexual, and other men who have sex with men (MSM). Within this population, young Black and African American MSM are the most affected subpopulation—three of four new HIV diagnoses in Black and African American MSM are among people ages 13-34.



We grieve the killing of Renee Nicole Good, a 37 year-old mother and legal observer, by Immigration and Customs Enforcement in Minneapolis yesterday—an act of state violence that has stolen a life and reverberates through an already-wounded community. This is not an isolated incident, but the result of policies that criminalize immigration and enforce borders through fear, surveillance, and force rather than care.

Side With Love is in solidarity with immigrant communities in Minneapolis and across the country who live under constant threat of detention, separation, and death at the hands of the state. We are in solidarity with the faithful masses of people showing up to build a world where the worth and dignity of all are held as sacred and unshakable truth.

As people of faith and conscience, we are called by love to tell the truth about this violence, to accompany those most impacted, and to keep organizing toward fulfilling the promise of our communities and institutions to make safety, belonging, and freedom real for all.

We join many others in demanding accountability and an immediate end to I.C.E. operations in all our communities. We invite all people of faith and conscience to grieve together, to refuse the normalization of state violence, and to commit themselves to the long work of transforming the systems that betray our deepest moral and spiritual commitments..
