May 5, Rev. Patty and Marie Higgins: "A human rights revolution from the tomato fields of Immokalee, Florida, to the Prescott Farmer's Market."

There is a movement underway to bring justice where there has been suffering in the world of farmworkers in the United States. During our May services, our Seeds of Support will go to "Feed Our Neighbors," a program that our congregation has been deeply connected with since the pandemic. How are food insecurity and farmworkers' rights connected? What is our role in this place?

May 12, Rev. Patty Willis: "Mothers of the Plaza de Mayo."

When Azucena Villaflor's son and his fiancé disappeared, she would not be silent. When she found other mothers with missing children, a movement was born. The mothers' non-violent resistance changed everything. On that plaza, as ours, people had to learn how to keep their cool. After our service, we will learn from Brian Willison about the first steps of how to do this.

May 19, Manuel Lucero IV, Cherokee and Director of the Museum of Indigenous People: "The First Peoples of Prescott."

The original inhabitants of this area and who they are today. He and his family are deeply involved with the local Native community and participate in Pow-Wow and Gourd Dances throughout the Southwest.

May 26, Rev Anthony Mtuaswa Johnson, minister at Sedona Unitarian Universalist Fellowship: "The Gift of Pluralism."

This service celebrates the rich tapestry of beliefs, cultures, and identities that make up our world, honoring pluralism as a spiritual gift that enriches our communities and enhances our understanding of the divine. Pluralism underscores the importance of embracing diversity, fostering inclusivity, and promoting a deep respect for the myriad paths that lead to truth and meaning.



You have expressed sadness to me as the news spread through our community. And, many of you have expressed both sadness and happiness. With your sadness is happiness for me and Mary Lou as we engage more fully in our creativity. Some of you are remembering your own choices to follow your heart even when it made others unhappy.

In the Weekly Peak and in my videos, I extend to you an invitation to come and see me so that we can spend time together. I'd love to share with you any thoughts you have in this moment. We could even sit and cry or say bad words. It is okay for us to be sad right now. Eventually or even in the midst of the sadness, we will begin to find laughter and joy. We have lots of good times to remember from the past five years and, of course, there is the present.

As Thich Nhat Hanh reveals to us, happiness already exists inside and around us in this moment. We must simply open the door... But in order to open the door, we must be attentive to the sadness that is with us. If you who have gone through the death of a loved one, you know that it is impossible to wish our sadness away. We must be faithful to our grief in order for it to open into joy. I promise to be faithful with you.

How can we do that?

During our Sunday worship services, I haven't wanted to bring up this sadness because that might be confusing for our new people. Please come to me after a service, if you are feeling sad or happy, and say, "Shall we spend some time?" I will say, "Yes!" I will be with you in this and be hoping that we can all find that door that will open onto joy. It is there. Always. Waiting.

On June 15 from 5 p.m., in our sanctuary, we will have a farewell service and I hope that you take the time to write to me or plan on saying something at that service. Tell me about what you will remember. How have we supported each other during these past five years? What have we learned? How have we laughed? How will we be forever changed? After that service, we will dance. I invite you to be present to saying goodbye.

For now, I'm going out on our deck to listen to the ponderosa and watch for that bird who comes each year to nest.

And, thanks to our hard-working Projects Team, more improvements are on the way! In the next few weeks, you will see big Improvements in our parking and landscaping behind the FD building. The purpose of the FD building landscaping is to prepare for the installation of playground equipment for our everactive, young Granite Peakers. Volunteers on the facilities team are poised to assemble the equipment once the site is ready. Sandra Palacios and the children have reason to be excited!

I am pleased to report that members of your Board, working to a punishingly short deadline of April 18, completed an exhaustively detailed application to the UUA for an interim minister for a one year period beginning August 1st, renewable for a second year.

On behalf of the Board, I want to thank Rev. Patty for her generous assistance with the application. I have heard fervent, opposing opinions about the desirability of a one year versus a two year interim. In fact, the argument is moot. The UUA no longer accepts specific requests for a one year or two year interim appointments. All UUA interim contracts now specify one year with an option of renewal for a second. Over the next month, we will see whether we can attract interesting applicants.

Please plan to come to our Annual Congregational Meeting scheduled May 5 after the Sunday service. A critical purpose of the meeting will be to approve the budget for fiscal year 2024-2025 that starts July 1.

The outstanding news is that WE HAVE EXCEED-ED OUR PLEDGE GOAL! Kudos to our incomparable Stewardship Team! If you know you are not going to be able to attend, please arrange to sign and deliver a proxy to a member who will be present.

Finally, the Project team is preparing information about much-needed upgrades and aspirational renovation alternatives. They have scheduled a presentation after service on June 2nd and will ask for a vote on alternative options the following Sunday, June 9. Please plan to participate in this momentous decision about the future of our sanctuary!

Board Buzz, Highlights of April 16, 2024, and April 18 Special-Board meeting

Board goals for 2023-2024:

- 1. Promote positive relationships that utilize clear, respectful communication.
- 2. Create a greater welcome through upkeep and changes to the exterior grounds, entry, and interior of our building that would better reflect our values and pride in our tradition.
- 3. Facilitate a clear congregational decision about the sanctuary remodel.

Minister's Resignation: Following Rev. Patty's decision to resign at the end of June, the Board began working with UUA representatives to guide us through a ministerial transition. Per their recommendation that a Transitions Team be made up of 3-5 Board members, Barbara Wilson, Dawn Korade, Treasurer Tracy Augustine and President Rick Denney were chosen to put together a packet of information about our congregation for ministerial candidates to review.

The pros and cons of Contract Ministry vs Interim Ministry were discussed and a decision will be made after the submission of our packet. It should be noted that Rev. Patty has expressed her highest regard for our congregation and has honored her word of providing five years of ministry to us. She will go on to pursue her many creative interests full time and we truly wish her well. She and her dynamic ministry will be missed! A farewell party for her and Music Director, Mary Lou Prince will be held on Saturday, June 15 at 5:00 pm.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer, Tracy Augustine, reported that, with 75% of the fiscal year completed, we have collected 81% of our budgeted revenue. With expenses so far at 75%, committee chairs need to be reminded to keep their expenses within budget amounts for the rest of this fiscal year (ending June 30, 2024).

This year's Stewardship Drive resulted in our largest amount of pledged income ever. Pledged income to date for 2024-2025 is \$253,481 which is slightly over our budgeted goal!

Minister's Report: Decisions are in the works regarding the best use of the Brownlee funds that were allocated to Social Justice. Under consideration are providing financial assistance to the Farmers Market "Feed Your Neighbors" program which provides food boxes to families experiencing food insecurity.

Another program might provide scholarships at Yavapai College to students who are studying a specific trade. A "New to UU" class was held and the 4th Friday potlucks encourage new members to share a meal with current members.

Sanctuary Renovation Planning: The Projects Team is planning a Sunday, June 2 presentation to the congregation on three suggested options for remodeling our Sanctuary, with their approximate costs. A yes or no vote on whether or not to have a Capital Campaign will be held Sunday, June 9. And if voters approve a capital campaign, which of the three options would congregants prefer? The Board is committed to have a concrete plan in place for the congregation by the end of this fiscal year on June 30, per its third goal.



Granite Peak Composting Tips

 When putting food scraps in the compost bins north of the faith development building please remember to cut the scraps, such as flowers, into sections and more than 5 inches long. This requirement makes turning the compost much easier.

- Also, when putting food scraps in the bin, make sure it's the bin that doesn't have the gray Cloth around the outside. That one is finished or finishing material. We want the new scraps in the bin that has the loose sleeves.
- Cover the food scraps with the leaves provided.
- Only vegetable or vegetative matter should be put in the compost, not fats or meat scraps.
- Also one last thing, please don't put in any plastic. Even though it may be designated as compostable plastic, the time it takes for this material to decompose won't work for our composting project.
- I'm happy to report that I think there's been robust use of the compost bins and the only limitation that we have is space and leaves and when we run out of those, we have to stop.



Introduction to Proposed Changes to the UU Principles and Sources (Article II of the UUA Bylaws) presented by Mary Ann Clark

The UUA and its members congregations are developing a revision to our current Principles and

Sources. A group has been working on these revisions for several years and a preliminary proposal was presented at last year's General Assembly. The final version of revisions (including some amendments) will be voted on by the delegates to the UUA General Assembly in June 2024.

Let's talk about what these changes mean and how we want our delegates to vote on both the amendments and final version of the proposal.

This workshop will review how our current principles and sources were developed. We will consider the process that as lead to the Values statements that are proposed to replace them as well as the Values statements themselves including the amendments that will be presented at this year's General Assembly.


If these Value statements are accepted, they will become the way we define ourselves as individual Unitarian Universalists, as congregations, and as a denomination.

Faith Development Happenings

March 31, 2024 : Spring Equinox

The Spring Equinox symbolizes renewal and rejuvenation. The students paid homage to the Spring Equinox by making a spring flower collage. The symbols of Ostara include spring flowers, fairies, butterflies, rabbits, and eggs. The colors of Ostara are pastels, yellow, orange, lavender, and green.



Additionally, the students assembled "Bags of Gratitude" to give to the less fortunate of our community. Included in the bags were special cards with messages of encouragement.



April 7, 2024: Total Eclipse of the Heart

Ainslee did a great presentation on the solar eclipse. She explained in detail, using graphs and diagrams, the stages and time frames of the eclipse. The students were shown an example of the safety glasses used during a solar eclipse. Afterward, they created an art project of the solar eclipse.



April 14, 2024: Mindfulness



The students were introduced to a program called "Kids Yoga" today. It was a step-by-step process but proved quite suc-

cessful. They went into a state of total mindfulness and relaxation, taking deep breaths and stretching. During the meditation, the students assembled Mala beads. Each time they strung a bead, their breathing (inhaling/exhaling) was paired with an intention of mindfulness. Mala beads are rooted in Hinduism and Buddhism and are meant to help you focus your mind during meditation.



April 21, 2024: Flowers for Pachamama

Pachamama is usually translated as Mother Earth in the Aymara and Quechua languages. "Pacha" means "world" and "mama" means "mother". The students watched a video of the Pachamama ceremony in the Andes mountains of Cusco, Peru. They created a glue-free Earth project using cardboard and paper tiles on adhesive paper. Afterward, the students took flowers to the sanctuary to commemorate The Flower Communion.



Let's have Dinner together again!



Remember Circle Dinners, aka Dinners for Eight? For years different small groups from our GPUU congregation met every month in small groups and in homes to share a meal and get to know each other. Stephanie Willison and Lydia Garrett got together to rekindle that long-standing event. This will replace the Progressive Dinners.

The groups will be different each month, taking turns as hosts and helping with the whole meal. The assignments will be planned for several months at a time so participants will know in advance the group they are a part of. Dates are chosen by each group to find their best day during the particular month.

May Seeds of Support is Feed Your Neighbors at the Prescott Farmer's Market.

Thanks to the assistance from individual donors, community partners, volunteers and partnering organizations, the Feed Your Neighbors (FYN) program has fed thousands of food-insecure individuals in our community since March of 2020.

With charitable funding, we purchase fresh produce from our local farmers. We then partner with local agencies to identify those who are in need and provide food assistance for them- be it delivering a FYN box of veggies, providing shopping assistance at the market utilizing FYN Food Vouchers, or simply ensuring our local food pantries are supplied with fresh options.

This program is a win-win because it provides fresh food to those who are struggling to put food on the table, while also supporting small family farms and, in turn, boosting the local economy.

Get to Know Tracy Augustine

Tracy was born in Brooklyn, NY, the oldest of five daugh-



ters. She was brought up as a Catholic and was very involved, including Folk Group where she played the guitar, and Teens Engaged In Active Ministry.

She was the first of her family to go away to college where she continued with Catholic services as coleader of the Folk Mass on campus. She also sang in the Duke University Chapel Choir and was one of the founding members of a women's acapella singing group which is still in existence at Duke, forty years later!

It was at Duke that her faith journey took a real change; after taking a religion class there, she switched her major from political science to religion and began to study religion more critically. She got to study a semester abroad in Israel which included an archaeological dig, one of her favorite experiences to date. After graduating, she left Catholicism and over the years tried various churches, and years of no church, until meeting Chris Hawthorne, now her husband, when they moved to Denver and became members of a UCC church.

Tracy and Chris moved from CO back to NY (for 9 years) and then lived in the Bay Area for 11 years before moving to Gilbert, AZ in 2016 with their son, Gabe, who attended Chandler High School. In their explorations of Arizona, they visited Prescott and thought how wonderful it would be to live here. When Gabe went off to college, they moved to Williamson Valley in August 2020, during the pandemic. It had been several years since they had found a church that aligned with their values, but they thought it would be especially important to find one living here, which was the most conservative town they had lived in.

Even on Zoom, GPUUC stood out to them, and they joined while still online, and didn't get to meet everyone face-to-face until a year later! 3.5 years later, Tracy is very active at GPUUC as Treasurer and Board member, a member of the Granite Peak Singers, and she will be leaving the Communications Team to join the Personnel Team this month. She and Chris are also co-chairs of Empty Bowls this year and are looking forward to another great fundraising year for our area food banks!
